Our Response

Parents/ Carers of deaf children and young people in Wales should be provided access to a broad range of freely available and readily accessible British Sign Language (BSL) learning opportunities to allow them to communicate with, and fully support their deaf child's social, emotional and mental health and development.

Courses are hard to find and learning BSL can be expensive. Furthermore, the Children's Commissioner for Wales' highlights the difficulties parents have accessing BSL which include "prohibitive costs, a lack of childcare, and a lack of support or suitable informal BSL learning opportunities such as support groups as key barriers to access to BSL." (2017, p20) and continues to make recommendations for "accessible and affordable BSL learning opportunities at a range of levels" (2017, p20).
